10:00am	Welcome and introduction by Christopher Fance, Chair of OLHA
10:05am	Early Medieval Benson: An Anglo-Saxon Royal Estate Centre Anglo-Saxon Benson was an important royal estate centre whose territory stretched across the Chilterns to Henley, and which in 1086 remained the most valuable royal estate in Oxfordshire. Simon Townley will look at Benson's emergence in its regional context, and at the changes which saw it decline into a large (though still thriving) village by the later Middle Ages.

11:20am	The Viking-Age World of the Watlington Hoard Discovered in 2015 and now displayed in the England 400-1600 gallery at the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford the hoard is an exceptional find of 9th-century silver jewellery, coins and ingots. It was buried at the end of the 870s, and can be related to the defeat of the Viking Great Army by the forces of Alfred the Great at the Battle of Edington in 878. John Naylor will explore the hoard's contents and what they tell us about Viking activity in southern England, and suggest how it might have ended up in a field a short ride from Benson.

12:30pm	Catherine Murray will introduce the afternoon's guided walk, and share a series of historic maps of Benson. The Bensington Society's History Group will display a copy of Richard Davis's fabulous 1788 map of the open fields and old inclosures of Benson, Berwick and Ewelme, the focus of a current research project.
1:00pm	Lunch: there are pubs and cafés in Benson, or packed lunches can be eaten in the Parish Hall.
2-3:30pm	Guided walk around Benson led by Catherine Murray and Dave Rushton The tour will highlight how Benson's buildings and layout reflect two very different aspects of village history: the coaching trade that brought prosperity in the 18th and early 19th centuries, with grand inns and fine houses along the High Street and Castle Square; and, in contrast, the growth of a squatter settlement along the Littleworth Waste, whose residents had humbler occupations.
